

Abilitree (Bend) — \$18,000

to expand job training, support, and employment opportunities for persons with disabilities through the Individual Placement Initiative

All Hands Raised / Portland Schools Foundation (Portland) — \$25,000

to manage and sustain the Cradle to Career partnership, designed to connect systems serving children from prenatal care through young adulthood

American Leadership Forum (Marylhurst) — \$10,000

to support the review and evaluation of ALF in Oregon over the past 25 years

Audubon Society of Portland (Portland) — \$25,000

to build organizational capacity through board and staff training, structured giving and outreach programs, and increased staffing

Baker County Community Literacy Coalition (Baker City) — \$5,500

to expand REAL, a literacy program that pairs adult volunteers with students and provides students with books to keep

Bienestar (Hillsboro) — \$10,000

to help low-income Latino youth prepare for life after high school through the Education Navigation program, providing workshops, school visits and career exploration opportunities

Boys and Girls Clubs of the Rogue Valley (Grants Pass) — \$20,000

to support Project Learn, reinforcing and enhancing the skills and knowledge young people learn at school during the hours they spend at Rogue Valley's four clubs

The Broadway Rose Theatre Company (Tigard) — \$10,000

to hire a .75 FTE Education and Community Outreach manager to provide program oversight, manage curriculum, increase attendance, and market programs to reach a broader audience

Building Healthy Families (Enterprise) — \$10,000

for a one-year-only grant to increase student engagement and reduce summer learning loss through after-school and summer programming in Wallowa County

Camp Odyssey (Portland) — \$10,000

to support a week-long residential camp and year round program providing youth access to leadership opportunities and education on racism, oppression, and privilege

CASA of Douglas County (Roseburg) — \$30,000

for Kids in Common -- a community collaborative with CASA, one of three major participants -- to provide family services aimed at reducing entry into foster care and the length of foster care stays

CASA of Douglas County (Roseburg) — \$15,000

to improve community giving by increasing the development director from 0.5 FTE to 1.0 FTE, building board stewardship, rebuilding the website, and building awareness through events

CASA of Jackson County (Medford) — \$16,500

to expand advocacy services to an additional 50 foster children this year

CAUSA Oregon (Salem) — \$10,000

to support implementation of a citizenship program to help eligible Legal Permanent Residents through the naturalization process

Central City Concern (Portland) — \$30,000

for the Community Volunteer Corps, providing clients transitioning out of homelessness with meaningful volunteer opportunities that increase their employability

Children's Center (Oregon City) — \$15,000

to expand capacity to serve children who are victims of physical or sexual abuse

Children's Healing Art Project (Portland) — \$20,000

to hire a new teaching artist that will assist in expanding the out-of-the-hospital Art Club to more critically or chronically ill and disabled children and their family members

The Children's Institute (Portland) — \$50,000

for Early Works, a community-based initiative to demonstrate the effectiveness of aligning and integrating early childhood education with elementary school education

Children's Relief Nursery (Portland) — \$50,000

for a new satellite nursery to serve the Gateway neighborhood, significantly increasing program capacity

City of Astoria (Astoria) — \$25,000

to develop the Garden of Surging Waves and Heritage Square, Astoria's tribute to Chinese immigrants who helped build the city

City of Myrtle Creek (Myrtle Creek) — \$12,000

to keep the South Umpqua Memorial Pool and community rooms open to the public during phase-two upgrades to the facility, including making it ADA-accessible

Clackamas Volunteers in Medicine (Oregon City) — \$20,000

to provide at the new Founders' Clinic free medical services for uninsured, low-income individuals who lack access to health care, wellness education, and treatment for chronic conditions

Coalition of Communities of Color (Portland) — \$25,000

to convene a Cradle to Career collaborative to connect systems serving children from prenatal care through young adulthood, with the goal to eliminate racial and ethnic educational disparities

Coalition of Community Health Clinics (Portland) — \$15,000

to create and implement a community-based, coordinated development strategy to ensure long-term viability of the organization

Columbia River Maritime Museum (Astoria) — \$25,000

for restoration of the museum's historic Astoria Railroad Depot to allow its use as a "Center for Traditional Maritime Skills and Trades"

Community Connection of Northeast Oregon (La Grande) — \$15,000

for the Kids Club, a state certified before- and after-school care program for children ages 5-12

Crooked River Watershed Council (Prineville) — \$10,000

to increase organizational capacity in order to expand services to landowners and youth who reside in the Crooked River Watershed

Crossroads Carnegie Art Center, Inc. (Baker City) — \$2,000

for production of newspaper-style schedules for the "Persistence in Clay" show coming to Crossroads in July and August of 2012

Crow's Shadow Institute of the Arts (Pendleton) — \$8,103

to implement a restructuring, training and fundraising plan for the board of directors

David's Harp (Portland) — \$5,000

to support the Community Integration Program for adults with major mental illness through the purchase of two vans and a garage

DePaul Industries (Portland) — \$28,000

for a partnership with Gerber Knives to provide a path to employment for persons with disabilities, including disabled military veterans

Douglas County Museum Foundation (Roseburg) — \$12,000

for expansion of educational programming for youth ages 3-18

for multi-cultural art programs for at-risk youth in rural Eastern Oregon

Enterprise Public Library (Enterprise) — \$28,511

to pave the gravel parking lot and build sidewalks and ramps to allow access for all

Eugene Symphony Association (Eugene) — \$10,000

for Music in Schools, supporting state learning standards in the arts by providing elementary students with access to standardized music curricula and instruction

Family Access Network Foundation (Bend) — \$20,000

to increase a development specialist position to full-time

Family Building Blocks (Salem) — \$25,000

to hire a coordinator to develop and implement a Parent Academy, helping parents to be more engaged in their children's education

Farmworker Housing Development Corp. (Woodburn) — \$19,591

to support organizational capacity building to diversify revenue streams through the addition of staff and purchase of a donor database

Financial Beginnings (Portland) — \$7,100

to increase organizational capacity to deliver financial literacy programs for youth by improving recruitment, training and retention of volunteers

Financial Stewardship Resources, Inc. (Philomath) — \$25,000

to expand training offerings for nonprofit board members in rural areas

The FISH of Roseburg (Roseburg) — \$20,000

for bridge funding to help meet increased demand for emergency food boxes

Fishtrap, Inc. (Enterprise) — \$20,000

to build organizational capacity by upgrading systems used for fundraising, marketing and technology

Friends of Buford Park & Mount Pisgah (Eugene) — \$5,750

to add a staff position to rebuild the volunteer involvement program in part to engage potential donors

Friends of Creston Children's Dental Clinic (Portland) — \$20,000

to develop a volunteer program, increase and diversify revenues and expand clinic staff in order to ensure sustainability of dental services to low-income children

Friends of the Children of the Klamath Basin (Klamath Falls) — \$10,000

to design the transition from high school to independent living for the first group of children who have been mentored since kindergarten

Friends of Zenger Farm (Portland) — \$20,000

for a program to teach low-income families in outer SE Portland how to shop for and prepare healthy meals on a limited budget

Gilliam County Public Library (Condon) — \$35,000

for the renovation of a former hardware store in the heart of downtown Condon to serve as new public library, replacing the current 400-sq. ft. library

Girl Scouts of Oregon and SW Washington (Portland) — \$25,000

to provide the Girl Scout leadership experience to Latinas grades K-12 with science, healthy living, literacy and art programs focusing primarily on Portland-Metro, Eastern Oregon, Salem-Metro and Medford

Gladstone Education Foundation (Gladstone) — \$25,000

to provide access to child and family support services by hiring a Family Resource Manager at the Gladstone Center for Children & Families, a service hub for low-income families

Habitat for Humanity-Mid-Willamette Valley (Salem) — \$30,000

to implement a program using Habitat build sites to teach divested youth construction trade skills

Hand2Mouth Theatre (Portland) — \$10,000

to support the creation of a 0.75 FTE managing director position to increase the administrative capacity of the organization and its ability to serve audiences statewide

Hispanic Metropolitan Chamber (Portland) — \$20,000

for a development director to build capacity and increase the number of businesses and students served

HomePlate Youth Services, Inc. (Hillsboro) — \$15,000

to increase the outreach worker to full-time to provide homeless youth in Washington County access to resources and mentoring

HOPE Equestrian Center (Eagle Point) — \$15,000

to support the adopt-a-rider program, providing therapeutic horseback riding for individuals with physical, emotional and learning disabilities that otherwise would not be able to participate due to income barriers

I Have A Dream Foundation - Oregon (Portland) — \$15,000

for the Dreamer School, expanding the long-term mentoring program by creating a culture of college for the children and youth currently involved in the program

Independent Order of Odd Fellows (Lostine) — \$10,000

for repairs to the Independent Order of Odd Fellows hall in Enterprise, which provides space for arts, cultural and educational activities, and houses the local Soroptomist International thrift store

Jackson County SART (Ashland) — \$17,940

to develop and implement a sexual violence prevention program for Ashland high school and middle school students, staff and parents

JOIN (Portland) — \$8,000

to support the operation of JOIN House, a basic service center for homeless individuals

Kerbyville Museum (Kerby) — \$8,000

for renovations to the exterior of the historical house that serves as the museum

La Pine Park and Recreation District (La Pine) — \$35,000

for renovations to the White School Building to transform it into the La Pine Event Center, a multi-use community facility

Linn County Child Victim Assessment Center, Inc. (Albany) — \$25,000

for expansion of counseling and support services for children ages 3-18 and family members dealing with child abuse issues

Living Opportunities, Inc. (Medford) — \$50,000

to build community relationships and cultivate jobs in local businesses to employ people with developmental disabilities

Lower Nehalem Community Trust (Manzanita) — \$6,000

to build organizational capacity to protect and steward land in the Lower Nehalem/Neahkahnie region of North Tillamook County by increasing staff levels

Mid Valley Mentors (Salem) — \$22,000

for bridge funding to provide continuation of mentoring services for 100 children of prisoners and at-risk youth in Marion County

Music Camps at Wallowa Lake (La Grande) — \$5,000

to hire musicians as counseling staff for both brass and woodwind music immersion camps to support middle and high school students

The Nature of Words (Bend) — \$10,000

to sustain and expand educational programs that provide creative writing instruction to Central Oregon youth and adults

Neighborhood Economic Development Corporation (Springfield) — \$20,000

for a business incubator that provides technical assistance and financial resources to entrepreneurs whose business activities benefit low-income, high-unemployment areas of Lane County

Neighborhood Health Center Dental (Beaverton) — \$25,000

for the Clackamas Healthy Smiles program, improving the oral health of children and families by expanding the scope of a dental hygienist at a clinic in Oregon City

New Avenues for Youth, Inc. (Portland) — \$20,000

to support a new program, Meta-Link, which will expand the safety net of support available for homeless youth who are most vulnerable due to mental health barriers but have to wait for case management services

Old Mill Center for Children & Families (Corvallis) — \$25,000

to provide mental health services to families at risk for child abuse and neglect and their children, ages 0-6

Opportunity Connections (Hood River) — \$22,000

for a part-time coordinator to integrate clients with disabilities into the community by building their social skills and connecting them to volunteer or job opportunities

Oregon Association of Relief Nurseries (Eugene) — \$20,000

to implement a rigorous strategic plan to strengthen and expand Oregon's relief nurseries which work to prevent child abuse by strengthening families

Oregon Children's Theatre (Portland) — \$20,000

for a capacity-building project, including capital improvements, that will lead to increased programming and earned revenue generation

Oregon Digital Library Consortium (Lake Oswego) — \$15,000

to expand the currently limited collection of free, downloadable library materials for Oregonians statewide by adding 15,000 new titles to the Library2Go online collection

Oregon Northwest Black Pioneers Corp. (Salem) — \$8,000

for a partnership with the Oregon Historical Society to develop Portland's African American Railroad Journey, an interactive exhibit with community programming focused on the history of Oregon's African American residents

Oregon Social Learning Center Foundation (Eugene) — \$27,650

to expand the KITS Program, a short-term intensive program to give children a boost in early literacy and social-emotional skills to help them transition to kindergarten

Oregon Tradeswomen Inc. (Portland) — \$10,000

for Building Girls, a program that encourages middle and high school girls to explore construction careers through hands-on activities led by tradeswomen role models

Port Orford Arts Council (Port Orford) — \$5,000

to provide art education for elementary school children in Curry County

The Portland Ballet (Portland) — \$20,000

to build organizational capacity to deliver ballet instruction by stabilizing revenues through the hiring of a part-time development director and a part-time marketing coordinator

Portland Center Stage (Portland) — \$5,000

to expand audience development capacity and maximize the online sales channel for theater tickets by creating a mobile version of the site for users of smart phones and similar technology

Portland Festival Symphony (Portland) — \$5,000

to match new or increased individual donations in order to provide free classical concerts in the Portland Parks during the summer

Portland Gay Men's Chorus (Portland) — \$20,000

to build organizational capacity by hiring development staff to diversify funding streams

Portland Institute for Contemporary Art (Portland) — \$25,000

to increase memberships and ticket-buyers by employing a full-time artistic director and providing a more accessible space to the public

Relief Nursery (Eugene) — \$25,000

for the Accessing Success Project, a family-centered substance abuse recovery program for parents of young children, with links to comprehensive Relief Nursery services

Rogue Valley Family YMCA (Medford) — \$33,000

to provide swimming lessons for low-income youth, access to water fitness classes for low-income adults and seniors, showers and aquatic assist devices for physically disabled individuals, and increased aquatic activities for families

Rogue Workforce Partnership (Medford) — \$60,000

to create a program focused on connecting youth with business-related opportunities, readying them for the workforce and reducing high school dropout rates

Rural Development Initiatives, Inc. (Eugene) — \$30,000

to support the mentoring component of Steps to Success, a microenterprise program that builds the economic development capacity of rural Latino community members

Sacagawea Health Center (St. Helens) — \$30,000

to hire an executive director to generate revenue for and coordinate the services of the school-based health center, implementing a new business plan

Salem Free Medical Clinic (Salem) — \$10,000

to add a volunteer coordinator to oversee an increase in the number of medical professionals volunteering to aid uninsured community members

The Shadow Project (Portland) — \$15,000

to expand and diversify revenue by recruiting additional board members, building individual and corporate giving, expanding outreach, and developing school district partnerships

Southern Oregon Public Television (Medford) — \$18,193

for the Immense Possibilities program, showcasing guests whose social creations help build vibrant communities and address substantive regional needs, broadcast via SOPTV and the Internet

Special Olympics Oregon (Portland) — \$23,720

for a Web-based registration and management system to improve organizational efficiency, increase accessibility for families, and reduce the risks associated with recruiting huge numbers of volunteers who work with a vulnerable population

Third Rail Repertory Theatre (Portland) — \$20,000

to build organizational capacity by hiring professional administrative and development staff to oversee volunteers, marketing, and donor relations

Umpqua Symphony Association (Roseburg) — \$5,000

to increase organizational capacity by hiring a part-time orchestra administrator

Umpqua Valley Arts Association (Roseburg) — \$20,000

to expand arts education programming for Douglas County children through summer arts camps, artist residencies, teacher trainings, field trips, and Saturday classes

United Way of Lane County (Springfield) — \$7,500

for the Financial Stability Partnership, for which United Way will convene key regional partners to discuss financial stability and affordable housing in order to identify a common community agenda

Washington County Museum (Portland) — \$15,000

to help fund an education coordinator

Waterfront Community Park Association (Hood River) — \$22,000

to complete phase two of Hood River Waterfront Park, including a public event area, trees, landscaping, vehicle access and utilities

Wildlife Images Rehabilitation and Education Center (Merlin) — \$5,000

to provide onsite school group tours for children in Josephine and Jackson counties, designed to be a tool for teachers to instruct students about the natural world

Willamette Valley Law Project (Woodburn) — \$15,000

to help establish the CAPACES Leadership Institute, with the intention to develop deeper commitment and skills of grassroots Latino leaders serving and organizing the Northern and Mid-Willamette Valley Latino community

Women's Crisis Support Team (Grants Pass) — \$20,000

to support the violence education prevention program, providing teen population groups the strategies, values, and relationship skills to reduce the incidence of violent acts before they occur
