# ARC of Lane County (Springfield) — \$20,000

for bridge funding to replace lost income due to the recession

# Arts Central (Bend) — \$15,000

to improve the artist-in-schools residency program and extend in-school trainings to Bear Creek Elementary in Bend and to Prineville and La Pine

# Bag and Baggage Productions (Hillsboro) - \$10,000

to build capacity by hiring a company manager

# Baker Community Choir, Inc. (Baker City) - \$4,000

to establish an after-school choir program in two elementary schools in Baker County

# Bandon Community Health Center (Bandon) - \$25,000

to create the Youth Leadership Corps, an indigenous-based approach to leadership development in Native American youth

### Neighborhood Economic Development Corporation (Springfield) - \$20,000

to spearhead revitalization in downtown Springfield using the Main Street approach and increasing capital for low-income businesses, homebuyers and farmers

### Next Door, Inc. (Hood River) - \$25,000

to secure administrative economies by converting a former store to offices, conference space and a day treatment facility, bringing several programs under a single roof

### North Coast Land Conservancy (Seaside) - \$5,000

for capacity-building efforts

### North Lincoln County Historical Museum (Lincoln City) - \$4,000

for bridge funding to support services while revenue is sought to replace lost county support

### North Lincoln Hospital Foundation (Lincoln City) — \$40,000

for construction of the Samaritan Early Learning Center on hospital district property

for lighting and restroom upgrades in Swigert Commons, a community space for public events

to transition the organization to more diversified, more sustainable sources of income

to support the final phase of a capital campaign to merge all Pearl Buck Center programs into a single, functional workspace
