

COMMUNITY WATER SOLUTIONS GRANTS AWARDED AS OF NOVEMBER 2017

AFFILIATED TRIBES OF NORTHWEST INDIANS

\$15,000 to support the Oregon Tribal Water Forum in convening the federally recognized tribes of Oregon to develop policy priorities for water issues

CITY OF NEWPORT

\$20,000 to support collaborative place-based water planning in the mid-coast of Oregon

DESCHUTES RIVER CONSERVANCY

\$10,000 to support community-wide outreach and raise awareness of water-related challenges in the upper Deschutes Basin

EASTERN OREGON WOMEN'S COALITION

\$25,000 to develop an educational campaign on innovative water-project partnership opportunities and to establish formal partnerships for multi-beneficial water projects

\$20,000 to identify water projects offering permanent solutions to water allocation in Northeastern Oregon

HARNEY COUNTY

\$20,000 to support collaborative, place-based water planning in the Malheur Basin

OREGON COMMUNITY SOLUTIONS

\$5,000 to review the Oregon Water Resources Department's place-based water planning efforts

POWDER VALLEY WATER CONTROL DISTRICT

\$10,000 to hire a facilitator who will convene a partnership of stakeholders to identify and address water needs in Baker and Union counties

SUSTAINABLE NORTHWEST

\$20,000 to convene key water resource stakeholders in partnership with the Oregon Water Resources Department to learn about Oregon's place-based planning for community water needs

\$20,000 for a second workshop gathering place-based water planning communities — including Harney County, City of Newport, John Day and Grand Ronde — to network and compare progress

TILLAMOOK COUNTY

\$10,000 to support a planning process for bringing together farming and ecological restoration to identify lands where farm use and wetland restoration projects can exist compatibly

WALLOWA RESOURCES

\$19,470 to support development of a community-wide water planning initiative with diverse stakeholders in Wallowa County

WILLAMETTE PARTNERSHIP

\$19,470 for a solutions-oriented convening that will help Oregon communities integrate floodplain and stormwater management to reduce costs and improve ecological outcomes

YAMHILL SOIL & WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

\$14,927 to convene stakeholders in rural Strategic Implementation Areas to address water quality concerns and share lessons learned

\$15,000 to organize a second workshop allowing agencies, landowners and Soil and Water Conservation Districts to compare progress on the implementation of water quality improvement incentives
